CO-PRINCIPALS' MESSAGE

**Nau mai hoki mai - welcome back to kindergarten & school!!!
Ngā mihi nui ki a koutou e te whānau whānui,
dear parents, families, and friends.**

The rain couldn't put a damper on the first day back today as our kindergarten children and school students returned with lots of energy and excitement to reconnect with friends and teachers. Unfortunately there is still some sickness around - check out our notice re RSV further below in this newsletter. And tummy bugs too, I hear - we wish anyone affected by this a speedy recovery and hope to see your children back soon!

During the term break, I had the privilege and pleasure of travelling up to Taikura Steiner School in Hastings with 10 other colleagues to the four-day Kolisko conference (named after Eugen Kolisko, an Austrian physician and educator who taught at the first Waldorf school in Stuttgart in the 1920s and 30s). Kolisko conferences are held around the world and bring together health professionals and teachers, providing opportunities for mutual exchange and inspiration. Sometimes, Waldorf education has been referred to as a "healing education" - today. As we continue to look for new and better ways to meet the diverse needs of our students, this aspect of our jobs is just as relevant for us teachers as it was 100 years ago, when a young generation and their parents was traumatised by



their families' experiences of a World War: "Striving for Identity through the Challenges of Anxiety, Stress and Depression" was the theme of this conference, and over 250 attended (see the snapshot below).

This huge audience enjoyed a fantastic range of keynote speakers, a rich selection of workshops and an emotional as well as hilarious play performed by Rob Mokaraka. This play in itself was an incredible performance and dealt with the most difficult, sad and confronting topics in honest and truly heartfelt ways - aroha mai, aroha atu! We Te Rā & Te Rāwhiti teachers returned back to our 'dayjobs' well nourished in mind and soul.

A particular highlight for me was the realisation that the expert perspectives held by those on the coal face of social work and in mental health align with the aspirations and wishes that, as parents, we hold for our own children. To name just a few ...

- A sense of belonging through a deep relationship with our environment and our cultural biographies, to stand strong in who they are and who they are becoming.
- A sense of a higher purpose in life to provide guidance in an ever more confusing and complex world, enabling them to make good choices and decisions.
- The ability to form and maintain healthy, trusting connections with others.

With a new Strategic Plan for our school in mind, this is so much the direction we want to move into more consciously, and the heartwarming inspiration was just perfectly timed!

Other takeaways from the conference ... we are pleased to warmly invite you to two amazing evening talks for our whānau:

- Edith Van der Meer, one of the conference organisers, is going to talk about **The gift of childhood - how can we protect it? (Tuesday 3 August 7pm)**.
- And we have been lucky to catch Mary Willow (who facilitated a workshop and presented) just before she is off on a sabbatical, for one of her fantastic talks on **child development and parenting (Thursday 19 August 7pm)**.
- Both of these will be in the hall, entry by koha

TE RĀWHITI PĀNU

A full update was sent out last week to families and whānau so here are just some key highlights are included below for the kindergarten this newsletter.

STAFFING

We welcome back kaiako Becky to Riroriro after her term two injury recuperation. We are still without a Kaiārahi and the Trust has been meeting regularly to look at different ways to best structure this role. This is still work in progress, and it has been determined that we will not rush to an appointment until we are sure of the breadth of the role, skillset required, how the role reports through to a governance group and even where they may have an office space on the school site. In the meantime Carrie will continue to co-ordinate practical and administrative matters, your child's Kaiako should be your first port of call for all questions relating to your child, and I am available on the above email for any follow up queries. If you are at all unsure who to talk to about anything check with Carrie or your child's kaiako.

POLICY CONSULTATION

Carrie will be in touch shortly with the process on how to provide feedback on our kindergarten policies. An enormous amount of work was completed behind the scenes in term two, bringing our policies out of the school realm and updating for practical kindergarten use. This is very much the work of Vanessa and Suzi for which we offer much thanks.

SIGNING IN & OUT

Please remember to sign your child/children both in and out and note the exact time too. Our kindergarten relies heavily on government funding and government funding is paid based on the times you have marked down being entered into the funding system. We are unable to load data if not signed.

PARENT/WHĀNAU EDUCATION

Term 3 looks to be filled with opportunities for parents to attend education evenings and meetings with kaiako. Please do make the effort, where you can, to attend these. These give you, as whānau, a glimpse into your child's world. These glimpses help us, as parents and caregivers, support their journey. And it's a great opportunity to share and pick up strategies we may never have dreamt up on our own! Look out for the various notices in this newsletter.

MESSAGE FROM THE TE RĀ SCHOOL BOARD

School boards actively manage adherence to the COVID-19 health and safety measures outlined on the Ministry of Health website. Under the Health and Safety at Work Act 2015 boards must so far as is reasonably practicable, consult, co-operate with, and co-ordinate health and safety activities with the Ministry of Health in health and safety matters related to improving, promoting, and protecting public health.

As per the Ministry of Health's *Professional Standards for School-based Immunisation Service Delivery*, it is the role of each board to decide whether to allow that the school premises be used for vaccinations to be administered. The Te Rā School board has decided to not allow the use of our premises for the purpose of vaccination. This applies for all vaccination programmes, including those against COVID-19.

Te Rā School will continue to pass on all directives of the Director General of Health and communications from the Ministries of Education and Health or the DHB regarding COVID-19 to our whānau through our normal communications channels, to ensure our whānau remain fully informed.

Biodiversity and Childhood Health Study (Massey University) - reminder

Just before the term break the office sent home an information pack about this interesting project to whānau of children aged 6 and over, via child mail. Our school board was provided with a lot of information about this prior and is in support of the study's kaupapa. Perhaps the results will support the creation of natural environments around all schools in this country!



Of course, it is completely up to each family to decide if they are interested in participating in this study. Te Rā School has no involvement other than to distribute the information to our community and we do not share information about our students with Massey University or individual researchers at any point during this research. Please note that if you do not wish to participate, you do not need to opt out or respond.

Here is a message from the Massey team:

Researchers at Massey University are studying how the natural environment affects health in children. The aim of the study is to find out if exposure to greater plant biodiversity may protect against several health conditions including, asthma and allergies.

If your child is **6-11 years old**, the research team would be grateful if you would consider taking part. For this study we need all children - including those who do and those who do not have asthma and allergies.

The study involves completing a questionnaire and your child taking part in a breathing and an allergy test. A smaller number of selected participants will be invited to take part in a second phase of the study, which would involve some further health tests.
