MESSAGE TO OUR COMMUNITY

Kia ora koutou e ngā whānau o te kura o Te Rā, me ngā whānau o Te Rāwhiti hoki.

A warm welcome also to all of our new kindergarten and school whānau whose children have just started, or will soon be starting their sessions at Te Rāwhiti. And of course, nau mai hoki mai, welcome back to all existing kindergarten and school whānau.

He mīharo hoki te timatanga o te tau, ia tau, ia tau. Each year, the beginning of Term 1 is very joyful indeed, with the school pōwhiri to welcome our new whānau and staff, and the Sunflower Welcome to our

new Class 1 children. Thank you to all staff and whānau involved in making this beautiful day for all of us happen!

Just as Te Rāwhiti and Te Rā are closely interwoven in kaupapa and the mahi of our staff, so was the first day of school, with the two celebrations side by side - started by the karanga, the first voice heard on the marae, the Pōwhiri stands firmly in te ao Māori and is the foundation on which the Sunflower Ceremony then follows.







This week started with **Waitangi Day / Te Rā o Waitangi**. All of us in this country are called on remembering the foundation that is Te Tiriti, and on reflecting what this means for us individually and personally, and as members of different groups and communities.

Last October, many of our teachers and support staff, alongside members of school board and the Kapiti Waldorf Trust embarked on a **professional development journey led by Takawai and Chris Murphy**. Chris and Takawai, both originally teachers, have been running their <u>Te Pumaomao Nation</u> <u>Building</u> successfully for many, many years, for schools, universities, city councils, public and private organisations. To call this PLD thought-provoking and inspiring is an understatement! The outcomes of this work, which is ongoing over this year, will be visible and tangible - in classrooms for the children as much as in all other spaces that nourish and sustain our education.



As teachers, we are always called to review and shape curriculum and pedagogical practice - after all, Waldorf education at its inception was a call for renewal, not for rehashing! For almost 10 years now, our school has been steadily taking steps towards what our Strategic Plan describes as *He Waka Haurua: Authentic Bicultural Education.*

This is something we want to shape along with our community. One of our stepping stones on that path will be regular opportunities for those who are keen to meet and talk about how we can work together to strengthen bicultural education, tikanga Māori and te reo Māori, at kindergarten and school - to form *Te Rōpō Tautoko i te Kaupapa Māori*.

If that speaks to your heart too, we would love you to join us at **our next hui on Friday 24 February 3-4pm in our hall**.

2023 School Dress Code

It's either loved (because it creates clarity of expectations ...) or loathed (because the clarity comes as a rule ...) - the Dress Code is one of those things that is easy to put in the too-hard basket, for teachers as much as parents. It's another thing to keep an eye on, and particularly for older children, another thing to discuss and insist on.

But there are good reasons for it, to do with health and safety as much as with creating optimal conditions for learning, including healthy habits of self-management. You can now find the full version on the website or read it <u>here</u>.

We have kept it short & sweet and not gone into too many details. If you do have questions about specific aspects of the Dress Code relating to your child, please speak in the first instance with your child's class teacher.

2023 Changes to Assessment & Reporting (Classes 1-7)

Over the last years, starting with the curriculum area math, teachers have been reviewing how to carry out assessments and track student learning and achievement in ways that are more suited to tracking individual progress. We have now made a decision to shift to a new way of doing this, and it will affect also on how we report student achievement to parents. As school, we are fortunate to have relationships with other schools who have moved in the same direction, and we can learn from what has worked for them (and also from what hasn't, of course).


We believe that this is an exciting change that will enhance learning and teaching at Te Rā School.

MOVING AWAY FROM SUMMATIVE ASSESSMENT ...

Most of you will know that teachers assess student learning against expectations for their age group. This is most formalised for math, reading and writing. Waldorf Schools in Aotearoa NZ have agreed on benchmarks for each class, articulated into "Learning Steps", that guide teachers in planning and assessing. For Class 4 and above, we also carry out standardised tests that are referenced against national benchmarks that apply for all schools, not just Waldorf.

For parents, this can be useful to understand how their child is going,

particularly if they are worried about how well they are doing. It is information that is useful to give an overall picture of how we are doing as a school, and it feeds into a national project where Waldorf Schools around the country are sharing information about their schools. It reassures the Ministry of Education that the state-integrated Waldorf schools they are funding are well worth their money. It might also reassure prospective parents who worry that our pedagogy of an 'unhurried childhood' could lead to poorer educational outcomes - which is clearly not the case!



- Provides a final evaluation of concept knowledge.
- High-stakes testing that often involves ranking of students.

Formative Assessment

- Occurs during the learning process.
- Allows teachers and students to pivot their strategies.
- Identifies areas for improvement.
- Gives opportunities for students to implement feedback.

... TOWARDS FORMATIVE ASSESSMENT

On the other hand, there is a lot more to learning and achievement than that. For some years now we (teachers, school leaders & board members) have been wondering how we can better capture individual progress in a way that also informs how teachers can plan ahead to meet the needs of individual students that they know so well, in a much more wholesome way than could ever be captured by tests or benchmarks.

This is, in fact, a contemporary version of what was envisaged when the first Waldorf School was founded over 100 years ago. *Ka huri whakamuri ka haere whakamua.* Looking back can take us into the future.

WHAT DOES THAT MEAN FOR PARENTS, CAREGIVERS AND WIDER WHĀNAU?

The first change for parents & caregivers is timing. Instead of reporting to whānau in the middle and end of the year, teachers will report in Terms 1 and 3. This allows changes to their teaching practice to be made within the school year, rather than trying to re-start after a long summer break.

The second change is that there is a larger face-to-face component to reporting: this will be in the form of two annual Partnership Hui, to which parents and wider whānau will be invited in Term 1 and Term 3. The hui be followed up by a brief written summary. These summaries form part of a progress report into which teachers and whānau have input.

At the end of the year, whānau will still receive an year report that gives an overview over the content covered over the year and over the journey of the class.

This is it in a nutshell - though of course there is a lot more to it than meets the eye, particularly in terms of the changes teachers are making. But we are very excited about the potential this has for teacher practice, and for making the relationships between school and whānau really meaningful for the benefit for the children.

So, watch that space as we navigate new territory together!


